The interesting project of a bell fower, with a carillon, for Washing-ton was proposed at the Thursday dinner of the Arts Club by J. Marion Shull. It was suggested that the chim-ing bell tower should be erected in Meridian Hill Park, whence the ca-rillon could sound forth to all Wash-ington in a fitting manner a reminder of America's heroes in the world war, and at the same time serve as a trib-nte to Belgium, which country, with Holland, is the home of the carillon's peaceful chiming.

Suggests 52-Bell Instrument

Suggests 52-Ben Instrument. Mr. Shull described in detail the ca-rillons of Belgium and Holland, where the best examples are found. He made special reference to the famous carillon at Malines, Belgium, which is composed of 50 bells, or nearly four octaves of the chromatic scale. It was proposed that the Washington bell tower should have a carillon of 52 bells, which would constitute the four full octaves of the chromatic scale. chromatic

In nontechnical In nontechnical terms, a carillon differs from a chime simply in having forty or more bells instead of five to or forty (twelve forty or more bells instead of five to twelve and in having the bells fixed and struck by hammers instead of swinging and struck by tongues. Bars, wires or tubes are sometimes used in place of hells. The bells or bars are so hung and arranged that they can be played upon by either automatic mechanism or hand to produce a har-monious tone in the way of psalms.
