CHIMES DEDICATION PLANNED SATURDAY

Set of 10 Bells Given By
Bernard H. Smith in Mem-
ory of Classmate, Dr War-
ren E. Hinds

Amherst, April 28—Dedication of the set of 10 new bells at Massachusetts State college will take place Saturday in the completely renovated old chapel. A concert following the formal program will mark the first time that chimes have ever been heard on the campus. Bernard H. Smith of Brooklyn, N. Y., has presented the chimes to the college in memory of his classmate of 1899, Warren Elmer Hinds, entomologist who died in 1935.

Dean William L. Machmer will preside at the dedicatory exercises. Following the presentation by Mr Smith and the acceptance by President Hugh P. Baker, a tribute to Dr Hinds will be offered by Frederick H. Turner of Great Barrington, president of the class of 1899. Prof Frank Prentice Rand, head of the department of languages and literature, will give a dedicatory address on "Overtones."

The program of chimes will be played by Chester Meneely, president of the Meneely Bell company of Troy, N. Y., manufacturers of the bells. Opening with "America," the concert will vary in character from State college songs to "Old Black Joe."

The bells total nearly four tons. The largest, or tenor bell, weighs 2000 pounds, and the other nine vary in weight from 1550 to 275 pounds. They are of pure bell metal, consisting of 78 per cent Lake Superior copper and 22 per cent new block tin.

The college committee in charge

of the dedicatory exercises includes Dean Muchmer, chairman; George E. Emery, alumni secretary; Prof Stovall C. Goding, Phillip H. Smith and George Hubbard of Sunderland, alumni director.
