Belgian Artist Secured For Week of Concerts Starting Sunday

HUGEST BELL WEIGHS

ALMOST FOUR TONS

Set May Be Played By Three Methods — Only One in World With Organ Contact —Program Made Public

Anton Brees, one of the most famous of the world's carillonneurs, for 47 years organist at the Antwerp cathedral, Belgium, and still the city carillonneur at Antwerp, will play the dedication recitals for the new 61-

bell carillon at Trinity Methodist Episcopal church. Programs will be issued today for the dedication which will last the entire week beginning Sunday.

The carillon, the largest in the United States at the present time, is the gift of Horace A. Moses to the

church. It has been hung in the "singing tower" and it will be played by Mr Brees for the first time on Sunday atternoon, to be called "Carillon Sunday" at Trinity. Mrs J. Edward Snyder, Jr., director of music, and organist at Trinity, will be the church carrillonneur.

Anton Brees was born at Antwerp, Belgium. He is Laureate of the Royal Flemish conservatorium of

Antwerp where he received his musical education. At the close of the World war he took up the study of the carillon and was the first professional carillonneur to visit America. He is carillonneur of the Mercersburg readows.

Mr Brees has been called the Paderewski of the belfry. He taught the technic of his art to Frederick Roke, organist and carillonneur of Morristown, N. J., who has since become the ranking native player. Mr Rocke says of his master: "The technic of Anton Brees on the carillon clavier is the technic of a Courboin on the organ or a Cortot on the pianoforte, and the technic is used to the same end. namely: The perfect musical delineation of the particular composition in, hand."

The largest bell weighs 7918 pounds and the smallest 14 pounds. Four octaves, with one semi-tone omitted, are covered with 48 bells. Thirteen duplicate bells making two bells to each note on the upper octave, or 61 bells in all. The total weight of all the bells is 44,634 pounds.

The largest bell is six feet in diameter and the smallest, seven inches. The weight of the clapper on low C is 150 pounds, on high C one and one-half pounds. The resistance to the player has been considerably equalized by the compensating device of balance weights.

The tower in which the bells are hung is 100 feet high, the top tier of the bells is 80 feet above the street and the bottom tier 60 feet. The clavier or keybeard in the carilloneur's room is directly under and 21 feet below the largest or bottom tier of bells. Another room in the tower, holds the practice clavier which can be played without disturbing those within hearing of the bells. The touch is the same as at the actual clavier, hammers connecting with the keys striking metal bars in place of bells.

The carillon may be heard at best advantage at 1000 or 2000 feet. Tunes advantage at 1000 or 2000 feet. Tunes have been readily distinguished at a distance of three miles, the carrying power depending on the direction of the wind, the hight of the bells and whether the sound is unobstructed.

The bells of the Trinity carillon are east of purest bell metal, a mix-

are cast of purest bell metal, a mixture of best quality copper and tin alloy. Each bell is giveranteed to be of the most musical tone and in perfect tune. Once tuned by the Taylor true-harmoninic system, the bells will retain their tone indefinitely. Extremes of temperature do not affect the quality of tone or timbre, relative pitch, tone or note of the bells. Three methods may be used for playing the Trinity carillon, the first from the clavler direct by the carillonneur, the second by means of an electro-pneumatic apparatus which in effect is similar to a pianola, and the third from the keyboard of the organ by the organist. The Trinity carillon is the only one in the world which may be played from the church organ, Visitors will be able to see the bells which are reached by 68 steps from the west transept vestibule.
