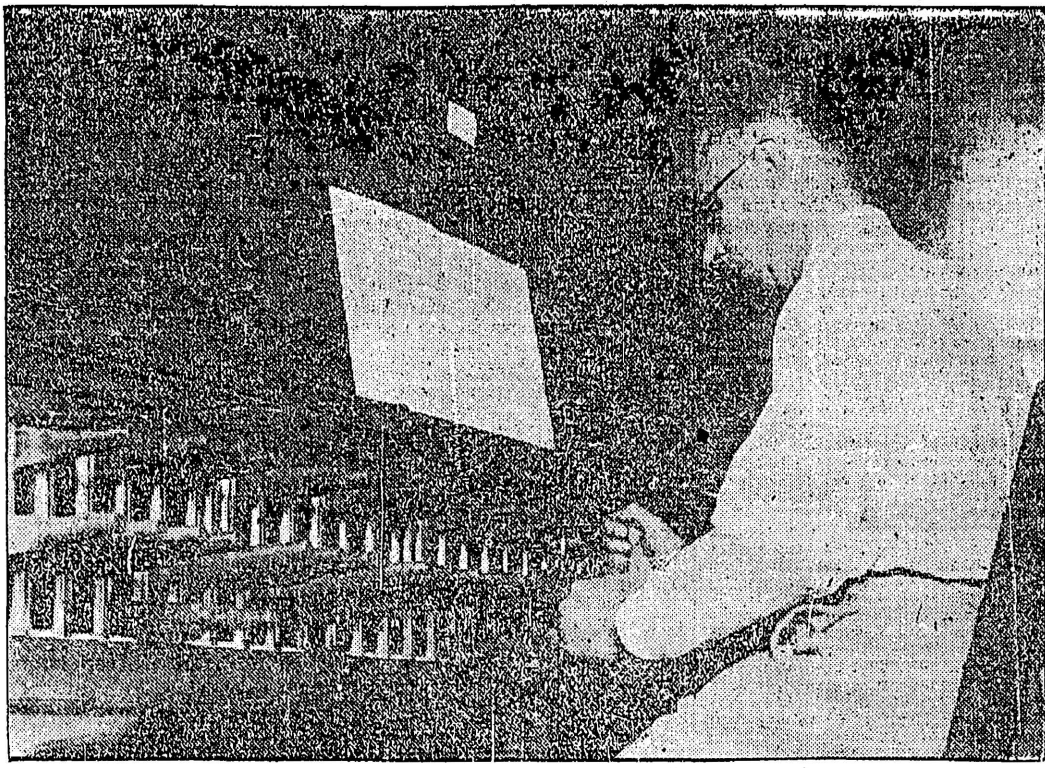


# Anton Brees Before Clavier of Trinity Church Carillon to Be Dedicated Today at 4

## Will Play Largest Carillon in Country Afternoons This Week

Dedication of the great 61-bell carillon in the tower at Trinity Methodist Episcopal church will take place this afternoon at 4. It is the largest carillon at the present time in this country and one of the largest in the world. The dedication concert will be played by Anton Brees of Antwerp, Belgian, and Mercersburg, Pa., the most famous of the world's younger carilloneurs.

Trinity's carillon is the gift to the church by Horace A. Moses. At the morning service at the church today at 11 the minister, Rev. Dr. Fred Winslow Adams, will preach a special sermon on "The Message of the Carillon."

Mr. Brees will give concerts each afternoon throughout the week.

## SHOOTING DRAWS LARGE CROWD AND SQUAD OF POLICE

### Albert Nolan Arrested For Drunkenness After Firing Shot Through Window — Believed Cleaning Gun

All the excitement of a shooting without anybody being hurt took place last night, attracting a crowd of several hundred to the vicinity of 64 Margaret street. The house is about half way between Main street and Columbus avenue. Police received a dozen telephone calls saying that someone had been shot. Lieut. George W. Bleknel answered the calls with Sergt. Charles M. Feeney and Officers Leonard Dorsey and Edward Connolly.

Police found Albert Nolan, 26, of 64 Margaret street, in his room on the second floor with a 13-gauge shotgun containing an exploded shell. Nolan was arrested charged with intoxication. A large hole in a window screen showed where the shell had passed through, but the police could not find out where it struck. The nearest building on that side is in an apartment block about 200 feet away with brick walls and many windows facing toward Nolan's window. No windows were broken.

There were more shells in the gun and on a bureau. Mrs. Nolan said her husband had planned to go fishing, but that she had dissuaded him because he had been drinking. Police also found cleaning utensils on the floor near the gun and were convinced that Nolan had accidentally

## SPORTING EVENTS END WALTONIANS' FIRST CONVENTION

### Fly Casting, Trap Shooting and Outboard Motor Races at Riverside Have More Than 125 Participants

Massachusetts Waltonians closed their first annual state convention here yesterday with a program of sporting events and a show dinner at Riverside park. The fly casting, trap shooting and outboard motor races were participated in by more than 125 sportsmen from this and adjoining states.

In the trap shooting contests, A. E. Snow of Springfield won first place and Norman F. Cooper, also of this city, took second award in the 25-target affair, with an added bird handicap. Another 25-target contest, open to all, resulted in a tie for first place between J. R. Hinkson of Springfield and Valentine F. Skiff, well-known sportsman of this city, each breaking 22 out of 25 pigeons. They split the cash prize of \$15. Second prize, \$10 in cash, was won by H. E. Hawley of Waltham, who in the competition to decide who would receive second money, broke 14 out of the 15 targets.

#### Wins State Championship

A straight 25-target event was won by A. C. Monroe of Boston. The Massachusetts Waltonian championship, a 25-target event with an added bird handicap, was won by Valentine F. Skiff, who broke 47 out of 50 pigeons, with A. C. Monroe, second. Skiff also won the long-run prize in this event, breaking 26 targets in a row.
