

Trinity Church's New Carillon Dedicated While 2000 Persons Hear Concert by Anton Brees

Several Thousand More Gather in Forest Park and on Nearby Streets to Hear City's Newest Set of Bells—Dr Leopold A. Nies Pronounces Words of Dedication and Rev Dr Fred Winslow Adams Leads Prayers.

Traffic on Sumner avenue was practically at a standstill yesterday afternoon at 4 when a crowd of about 2000 persons packed the spacious lawn of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church and filled the sidewalks on both sides of the avenue to take part in the exercises dedicating Trinity's great 61-bell carillon "to the praise of God."

It is estimated that several thousand and more, gathered in Forest park and on Churchill, Oakland and other nearby streets leading off Sumner avenue, "listened in" on the carillon concert played before and after the dedication, by Anton Brees, famous Belgian carillonneur.

Automobiles were parked in a solid line on both sides of Sumner avenue in front of the church and for a block or more on either side. Cars were also closely parked on Oakland street and other streets in the vicinity of the church. Special traffic officers from the Springfield police department were on duty at the street intersections and a motorcycle officer was also detailed for work there to aid in handling the crowds.

Assemble On Lawn

Ropes strung from the end of the Community house to the side of the new church building kept the crowd back from the entrance to Trinity Community house and Grace chapel until after the exercises. Into this cleared area marched members of the church's official board, followed by the church choir and then by Rev. Dr Leopold A. Nies, superintendent of the Springfield district of the New England Methodist Episcopal conference, and Rev Dr Fred Winslow Adams, minister of Trinity church.

Then came the 4-H club boys and girls from Camp Vall, carrying their state flags. They attended the exercises as the special guests of Horace A. Moses who gave the carillon to the church and they added a highly colorful touch to the scene. Drs Nies and Adams with Philip C. Landers, director of religious education at the church, stood on the steps of Grace chapel during the actual dedication ceremony. Members of the church board, the choir and the massed flags of the 4-H clubs were gathered at left of the chapel steps, extending toward the Community house.

Dr Nies read for the Scripture lesson, Psalm 150, and pronounced the words of dedication; "We dedicate this

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HOOVER TO OPEN DRIVE IN EAST AFTER QUIET DAY

Candidate to Go to Newark, N. J., Today For Busy Program of Speeches and Conferences

Washington, Sept. 16—(AP)—Resting in the Sabbath quiet of his home, Herbert Hoover fortified himself today for the arduous seven weeks of campaigning between him and the end of his campaign for the presidency.

With the exception of a few personal friends, he had no callers, and he stirred from the House only to worship at a Quaker meeting house on Thirteenth street with his wife and his son, Allan. A few small boys waited outside the church to catch a glimpse of the presidential candidate as he left, but with that exception he passed through the streets virtually unnoticed.

Tomorrow will see the Republican nominee again in battle harness. He will move upon New Jersey where at Newark he will launch his first offensive in the East in his drive for ballots.

Probably 500,000 persons will see Hoover before he turns homeward, while other millions will hear him over the big radio hookup that has been arranged to broadcast his speech. The candidate's train will arrive at Newark at 2.

After a brief call upon Mr and Mrs Edison at Menlo park, Hoover's party will return to Newark for a reception before going to the 1st regiment armory where the program incidental to the delivery of his speech will begin at 8.30 p. m., eastern daylight saving time.

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carillon to the praise of God." Dr Adams led the three prayers of dedication and Dr Nies then pronounced the benediction.

Following the exercises and the carillon recital postlude, the ropes were taken down and the public allowed to enter the Community house and chapel. Hundreds took advantage of the occasion to inspect the older part of Trinity's religious group, but they were not permitted to go into the new church because of its still unfinished condition.
