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There are four or five other memorial features of the Carillon, not bells, which are yet to be previded for. These involve an expenditure of from about \$100 to over \$1,000. Concerning these the committee can give detailed information. The committee consists of Thomas Hun, Marcus T. Reynolds, G. Y. Lousing and Mayor Thacher. William Gorham Rice is chairman.

The booklet will contain a tentative program of the opening recited of the Carillon and programs of later recitals. It also will give a list of the bells with the names of the donors, together with other interest-Tower.
