

Two Heights Churches Hold Recitals on New Carillons

The congregation of Church of the Saviour, Cleveland Heights, repeated a dedication litany yesterday morning to consecrate formally the newly installed set of 12 bells in the church tower. Immediately afterward Jack Staley, who has been appointed bell master for the church, played several hymns as the first official recital.

Also yesterday the newly completed 23-bell carillon at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Cleveland Heights, was given official approval following two morning recitals by Dr. Kmiel LeFevre of New York. The 60-year-old carillonneur of Riverside Baptist Church, New York, is recognized as one of the top-ranking bell artists in the United States.

The bells at Church of the Saviour were dedicated in memory of the late Mrs. Grace D. Arter and her daughter, Elizabeth, and are the gift of the husband and father, Charles K. Arter.

Other Work Scheduled

Cast by the Petit & Fritsen foundry in Holland, they were installed several weeks ago by the I. T. Verdin Co., Cincinnati. They are played electrically from a small keyboard console adjacent to the organ console.

The pastor, Dr. Howard J. Brown, announced that 11 more bells would be added soon, to make a complete carillon, and that a manual keyboard of wooden levers would also be installed to permit the traditional playing of the bells. This addition is expected

to be completed before Christmas.

In his sermon Dr. Brown said: "In remembrance we rekindle the visions and hopes and faiths that occasionally burn low. That is the joy of memorial gifts. A true memorial is not an end in itself. This memorial of bells is a beautiful memory translated into noble service.

"It is our earnest hope that in times of sorrow and loneliness, joy and gladness, they shall be for us, the reminder of the eternal God, and in this remembrance we will rekindle our dreams and our faith."

Staley played for a half hour in the afternoon. The recital is to become a regular Sunday afternoon program. The bells automatically ring the Westminster chimes each quarter hour from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m.

The carillon at St. Paul's Church will be under the direction of Guy Gray, who has been carillonneur for the church since 1935.

Dr. LeFevre, who founded a school for carillonneurs, one of the few in the world, in Belgium some years ago, is expected to return for the dedication of St. Paul's Church carillon in May.
